



## MANHATTAN GOLD

Earrings Kit



Cut 60-inches of thread. Leaving a 30-inch tail, create the widest row and row above using single-column peyote.




Build decreasing brick stitch rows following the pattern. Start the brickstitch row with two beads and go under the second thread bridge. Align the first bead in the row by going back through it, under the first thread bridge, then up through the second bead.




Tip: Weave the tail thread to exit from the bottom, edge bead.

John Bead ESTABLISHED 1954 Finish the row adding one bead to every thread bridge.



Use decreasing brick stitch to create the remaining rows up. Finish the top two rows together by using the alignment step to add the top bead on its side.





Weave in remaining working thread. Switch to using the tail thread and work the bottom half of the pattern. Repeat the above steps to finish the bottom, center bead and weave in remaining thread. Open the small round jump ring and feed it through the top bead. Attach the ear wire and close the jump ring.

Tip: feed the jump rings carefully. It should slide through the bead easily unless it is snagging thread, or due to cutting burs in the metal. Try switching the side of the jump ring being fed through the bead.



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
